Introduction

The information in this Fact Sheet is based on CCP's Annual Survey of Graduates. The following data reflects feedback from 1,807 graduates from 2001 through 2005. 
Access

A large proportion of all student groups would not have been able to participate in higher education if CCP had not been available to them. CCP was the only collegiate opportunity for at least one-third of all male graduates and over 40% of Black female and Latina graduates.

Transfers Outcomes

In the short-term, male graduates were more likely to have transferred than female graduates. Consequently, female graduates were more likely to hold the hope of continuing their education at a future point in time.



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
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Employment Outcomes

Among male graduates, Latinos and Blacks were most likely to be working in a career field that is related to their CCP studies within nine months to one year of graduation. The same was true for female graduates. Unemployment levels were highest for Asian females and Latinos and lowest for white male graduates.



Student Satisfaction

CCP graduates have been very satisfied with the preparation for transfer and employment they received while at CCP. The percentages in the following table represent the percentage of graduates who provided a rating of 'good' or 'excellent' to these aspects of their experience. Responses from Career program graduates are presented in the Employment Preparation table and responses from graduates are presented in the table labeled Transfer Preparation. All student responses are reflected in the Overall Experience. As a group, Asian male graduates were less satisfied than other graduates.
