Through the Sound Recording and Music Technology program, you will be able to complete several tasks:

- operate professional equipment and software
- use a mixing board and employ various microphone techniques
- manage, engineer and record live concerts
- compose music and create sound design for film and multimedia
- market a musical product through publishing, print music, recordings and videos
- understand the theory of how music is created, recorded and performed
- understand record contracts, publishing agreements and music licensing

Many students work together on additional projects that are not classroom assignments. These collaborations allow you to explore your creativity, practice your skills and learn from other students. The College also offers you opportunities to perform in different musical groups, led by faculty members, giving you experience performing in front of an audience and helping you perfect your craft.
