Chekemma J. Fulmore-Townsend President and CEO — Philadelphia Youth Network Chekemma is an energetic thought-leader focused on driving transformation in poverty and inequity for youth and young adults. In 2019 year, she was named as a Promise of America Awardee by America's Promise Alliance. In 2017, she was featured in The Chronicle of Philanthropy's special report, The Influencers: People Quietly Changing the Nonprofit World. In 2016, the Obama Administration honored her as a White House Champion of Change. Chekemma has shared her insight and expertise with a range of international audiences, including recent appearances at the United Nations as well as statewide and national summits across the country. Chekemma sits on the Board of the Community College of Philadelphia and serves as Chair of the Youth Community. She was appointed by Governor Tom Wolf to the Pennsylvania Workforce Development Board and serves as Chair to the Board's Youth Committee. As

President and CEO of PYN, she draws on her experience in research, social work, and systems change to lead the creation of coordinated systems that promote academic achievement, economic opportunity, and personal success.

Before her appointment as President and CEO, Chekemma served in various capacities throughout the organization. Most recently, as PYN's Vice President of Program Services, she led a team accountable for program design, implementation, evaluation, compliance, and continuous improvement. Prior to her work at PYN, Chekemma, served at the Philadelphia Workforce Development Corporation as the Senior Director of the Emerging Workforce, fusing data-driven decision-making with solid project management to implement and improve adult and youth workforce programs.

As a leader, Chekemma seeks to inspire passion, commitment and collaboration. She believes that improving lives requires hard work, courageous partners and time for laughter. She lives in the Greater Philadelphia area, and is a proud wife and mother of two daughters.

Chekemma holds her B.A. in Psychology and Master of Social Work from the University of Pennsylvania.

Sharrelle Barber, ScD, MPH is an Assistant Research Professor in the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics and the Urban Health Collaborative at the Drexel University Dornsife School of Public Health. She is also a faculty affiliate of the Center for the Study of Racism, Social Justice, and Health at the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health. Her research focuses on the intersection of "place, race, and health" and examines the role of structural racism in shaping racial health inequities among Blacks in the Southern United States and Brazil. Dr. Barber's research has been supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the American Heart Association, and the National Institutes for Health and she serves as co-chair of the Social Determinants of Health Working Group for the Jackson Heart Study based in Jackson, MS.



Currently, Dr. Barber is the national advisor and coordinator for the Poor People's Campaign COVID-19 Health Justice Advisory Committee, comprised of a group of public health experts from Harvard (FXB Center for Health and Human Rights), UCLA (Center for the Study of Racism, Social Justice, and Health), and other academic institutions across the country. The committee is charged with providing justice-centered public health expertise to the national steering committee as the movement charts a way forward for collective action and advocacy. During the pandemic, she has provided expert commentary on the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 in Black communities for local, national, and international media outlets including the NY Times, the Philadelphia Inquirer, NPR and Al Jazeera.

Dr. Barber received a Doctor of Science degree in Social Epidemiology from the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, a Master of Public Health from the UNC-Chapel Hill Gillings School of Global Public Health, and a Bachelor of Science in Biology from Bennett College. As a scholar-activist, Dr. Barber is committed to using her scholarship to make the invisible, visible; mobilize data for action; and ensure that our dialogue around racism and health inequities is global.

Program Description

When I first began teaching at CCP, under my first tenure-track position, and after 17 years of adjunct teaching, I knew very little about how to manage my own finances. But by harnessing the true power of a steady, predictable income, even if a humble one, I was able to get out of debt, save up an emergency fund, and find great joy in putting money into savings. It is impossible to explain the immediate effect on stress that savings can have until you experience it yourself, which is why I would like to offer my own tips and insight into taking control of your personal finances, making the most of this great job and income, and living the life you really want. To be more specific, there are many simple things you can start doing right now, like meeting with a TIAA advisor to fine-tune your retirement account (this can be done annually, and many older workers forget to adjust as they get closer to retirement), using an app like Mint to track all your spending in one easy location, doing an assessment of household expenses and determining if they truly add to your happiness (still have cable?), understanding the value of nixing your electric bill with solar, recognizing the dopamine effect of contributing to IRAs and ETFs (better than buying shoes), etc, etc, etc. Bring your own tips and ideas, along with questions. This will be an interactive and engaging session.

- Community in the Classroom: Participants will learn specific methods for encouraging students to see themselves as members of a community who all contribute to a successful classroom experience (including practices such as showing up prepared to discuss material, being on time, and others).
 Methods discussed will be in the areas of syllabus design, communication, policies, and assignment design and implementation.
- Student Preparedness: Participants will learn specific methods for fostering general student preparedness to be successful in the college setting, focusing especially on empowering them as partners in their education and their responsibilities as partners in their education (including practices such as keeping track of grades, how and when to communicate with professors, and others). Methods discussed will include areas of syllabus design, communication, policies, and assignment design and implementation.

Program Description

The growing trend that presupposes that learning is in an economic exchange wherein students pay money and professors provide education reveals itself in our classrooms in a variety of ways. This way of thinking fails to recognize students' power and responsibilities in the classroom, as well as the true nature of the work of educating and becoming educated. Learning is a collaborative process that is most effective when students see themselves as active, rather than receptive, participants. This approach not only empowers students, but in holding students accountable as partners in their education, alleviates some of the challenging aspects of teaching.

This session will provide a framework for thinking about the classroom as a community in which all are responsible for its success and specific pedagogical practices for bringing that framework to life in classrooms. The goal of this work is to contribute to learning environments that acknowledge and incorporate in their design the roles and responsibilities of each member, to increase success and decrease stress, for both students and professors.

Gain a better understanding of anti-racist curricular and pedagogical practices

Program Description

The convergence of two pandemics---anti-Black racism and a global heath crisis that is disproportionately impacting African American communities, in recent months has made it critically important to create the most inclusive community we can for our Black students and employees. In the past few months, we have witnessed a powerful worldwide movement where we have watched street protests for the ongoing murders of Black people, statues of Confederate racists have fallen to the ground, and calls for police reform and defunding have been included in local and city government action plans. But, how does this infectious energy around bold, unapologetic racial change translate into our workplace? How is it going to change the way we teach, the way we engage, the way we devise policies, the way we respond to this new climate? In this session we will discuss what real change and measurable progress look like in an anti-racist educational system and how we create safe spaces for Black faculty, admin, staff, and students to discuss inequities without fear of retribution. We will also consider the ways the BLM could change our teaching practices, classroom dynamics, and our value systems.

Program Description

Each semester over 1,000 of our students are placed on academic probation for the first time and are at a higher risk of losing their financial aid. The Counseling Department developed a campus-wide retention initiative, Campaign 67, designed to target new and first-time probation students. The purpose of Campaign 67 is to provide a preventative and proactive outreach to educate students on academic progress policies, develop practical skills for academic success, and support services through group and one on one counseling. This workshop will discuss the purpose of Campaign 67, the expansion to date, the importance of campus-wide collaboration, and how this initiative aligns with Guided Pathways.

Part of this has been in response to Middle States' proposal that that colleges examine General Education based on Essential Skills rather than disciplines. As a culmination of this effort, the six General Education Essential Skills will form the basis of our revised general education curriculum effective Fall 2021. In this series of interactive faculty led workshops, faculty will gain an understanding of the new and improved general education guidelines called Essential Skills. Faculty attending these workshops will become familiar with the six Essential Skills and how to intertwine the skills throughout their courses. In the workshops, faculty across disciplines will demonstrate projects, assessments and activities that highlight the embedded essential skills within their courses, CLOs and PLOs; demonstrate how students may connect essential skills with their lived experiences and how to apply the primary content of the course to work and life using the essential skills.

The Black Scholars Program was developed to assist in closing achievement gaps that disproportionately effect first generation black students. Mentorship has been a well research method of helping this students gain transition to college more successfully because it gives the students a person that can directly and intentionally help them negative college. For first generation students that may not have access to information, a mentor can be a vital part of their first few weeks in college. This seminar is designed to inform the audience about the results of the Black Scholars Program which was started in Fall 2020 and deliver training for current and prospective mentors. In its first year the program had over 60 mentors sign up and 65 students participate. Our research shows that over 78% of the students in the program where retained in to the next semester. The mentors and student students reported building strong relationships and feeling that it was a positive experience. The developers of the program plan to continue the program this upcoming Fall semester.

In accordance with the College's Child Abuse Reporting Policy (Policy #162) and the Pennsylvania Child Protective Services Law, any College employee who may come in contact with children in the course of employment at the College has a mandatory obligation to report child abuse which the employee knows about, sees, or has reasonable cause to suspect. The online training course, Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse: Mandated and Permissive Reporting in Pennsylvania, will give employees information regarding how to recognize and report child abuse in accordance with the Pennsylvania Child Protective Services Law. The online course is approved by the Pennsylvania Department of Education and takes three to four hours to complete. Jennifer Hagan will be available during the first hour of each session to provide instruction and assist with registration.

College employees who were previously notified by HR concerning their obligations under the PA Child Protective Services Law are required to complete this training. If you are unable to complete the training during this scheduled time, you must complete the training by September 30, 2020 and submit your certificate of completion to the HR department.

In this course, you will find a variety of tools, topics, theories, concepts, and laws to help you maximize personal development. Each individual subject covered can work autonomously or function interdependently to build upon one another. We will cover psychology, sociology and philosophy and demonstrate how these mutually inclusive areas of knowledge can be exponentially advantageous in helping us understanding ourselves, societal conditions, and impact on an individual's personal development.

The content and subsequent discussions are designed as an academic approach to personal development. Thus, in this context, there is no association with nor adherence to popular methods of life coaching, mentoring, or motivational-type activities. Instead the focus is on critical, outside of the box thinking by discerning the underlying factors that drive, motivate, and cause an individual to lean towards self-enhancement.

This unique and comprehensive approach to personal development goes beyond the improvement of oneself and exposing the participant to a variety of theoretical constructs, psychological concepts, philosophical principles, and sociological theories that govern society, thereby providing the foundation for professional, social, and individual growth, understanding and development.

The overall aim of this instructor-led and self-guided tutorial guide to critical thinking is to enable the reader to arm themselves with the underlying foundation essential to building a sustainable success strategy for personalized individual growth and personal achievement.

Using Reflection to Bridge Metacognitive Learning with Culturally Responsive Teaching

Learning Goals

In this session, five reflective activities for will be presented to stimulate culturally responsive teaching through metacognition. Metacognitive reflection not only integrates the reading and writing components of learning, but also it bridges noncognitive affective needs with cognitive elements to achieve overall true integration of the whole person in learning. After the presentation, participants will have an opportunity to work in groups to design reflective activities that address metacognition in their own contexts.

Program Description

For the past three years, our institution has been piloting the ALP model with Freshman Composition linked to Developmental Writing, but many of us are still using an "additive approach" with discreet learning objectives in reading and writing, and we struggle to achieve true integration of learning. Metacognitive reflection is one way to bridge this gap.

In addition, we also need strategies to address noncognitive issues based on restorative practices. We need tools for deep and integrative learning along with strategies that guide students to meet their own ends. Metacognitive reflection is culturally responsive.

The following reflective activities have been successfully integrated into College Writing, Developmental and ESL courses to address these needs. Sample assignments and student responses will include:

- Letters: Dialogue throughout the semester can be integrated into the curriculum, for instance, an opening letter (to begin the dialogue), cover letters (on every draft of an essay), peer letters (for peer review) and portfolio cover letters (reviewing one's work over the course of the semester)
- Reflections: After each essay, multi-paragraph reflections promote self-awareness of one's own literacy processes.
- Presentations: Student-led class discussions encourage self-directed learning / andragogy.
- Short-essay pre-writes and blogs: Prewriting questions can encourage the use of metacognitive tools for deep and integrative learning.
- Video posts and blogs: Video posts and blogging with peers can directly address analysis / reflection of one's thinking, reading and writing processes.

The BESST (Building an Electronic Partnership for Student Success and Transition) project was born out of such a desire among faculty at CCP and high school teachers from the School District of Philadelphia. Instead of organizing face-to-face sessions that often pose logistical challenges, an online partnership was developed using the college's learning management system. This presentation will discuss the impetus for an online partnership, its evolution, the e-content, professional learning communities, the challenges that were overcome, and the present outcomes of such a partnership.
