What happens when a Black woman gets labeled “aggressive” “difficult” or “unprofessional” in the workplace? If history is any indicator, this troubling mischaracterization helps her to become even more vulnerable to marginalization, and it ruins her potentiality for career advancement. Michelle Obama, Serena Williams, Jemele Hill and Shonda Rhimes are just a few high-profile Black women who have suffered public scrutiny after being labeled “angry and aggressive.” Black women work hard to be seen as affable because their likeability and public perception are tied to their survival. The angry black woman trope is one that has permeated every segment of our society from pop culture to social media, to even our classrooms and offices. Like most stereotypes, this one has limited the expression of Black women’s full range of emotions, but recent studies have also found that Black women experience negative health

outcomes including anxiety, at a greater rate than their white counterparts. In this session we will discuss the long-lasting effects of this one-dimensional view of Black women and learn how we can overcome the stereotype and what our institution can do to stop this stereotype from persisting.

Program Description

Stephen Covey, in *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, writes, "To begin with the end in mind means to start with a clear understanding of your destination. It means to know where you're going to better understand where you are now so that the steps you take are always in the right direction." This is the essence of backward design.

When the semester begins, professors often feel the pressure to teach students everything they need to know. Many courses become overloaded with content and the students end up feeling overwhelmed. With Backward Design, we begin our course design with the desired end

results, for example, the CLOs for the course or the program. From this vantage point, we are in a much better position to scaffold the semester's activities, both high- and low-stakes, that enhance student learning toward those results. In other words, we are better equipped to design teaching and learning activities that maintain focus to the specific ends of the learning outcomes: What do we want them to learn, and how will they demonstrate that they have learned it? The final step of backwards design is to check for consistency among all the constituent parts: the goals, the activities, the assignments, and the assessment (both formative and summative).

Backward design begins by shifting focus away from teaching what students “need to know” (i.e., all the content) to the “enduring understanding” that we want students to retain after they have forgotten all the details. With this essential learning in mind, we design the lessons, the activities, the assignments, the rubrics, and grading procedures while continuing to check for consistency among all these components.

Beginning at the end helps us keep the destination in constant focus as we delve into course content.
